Theo Tytaneck introduced the speaker. Theo was one of Julia's students when she taught at Brock University. A friendship ensued, and Theo shared her abiding appreciation of Julia as a person.

Holocaust: A Personal Perspective by Julia Frankel

Born in Eastern Europe and a retired professor of Russian Studies, Julia was well equipped to supply the historical background of the Holocaust. Historians have universally expressed a "wonderment" that such cruelty to fellow humans could ever be manifested.

Late one night, there was a knock on the door, and Julia's family fled. Rescued by her father's employer, the family went into hiding. Soon, the parents were sent to a ghetto, while their eight-year-old daughter was smuggled into Hungary dressed as a boy. There she remembers being hidden in a coal cellar for days at a time. Deeply touched by the pervasive reality of the Holocaust, and missing a normal childhood entirely, Julia nevertheless experienced countless acts of kindness toward her during those years.

Her mother also survived the Holocaust, and the two came to Canada in 1963.

John Tordiff thanked Julia for the most anticipated talk of the year, summarized as "good in the face of evil," and echoed by Anne Elliott in her closing remarks with "a sobering evening with a human face."
