Dr. Michael Manley-Casimir

Born and raised in Jersey in the Channel Islands, Mike attended Aldenham School for his secondary education and then the University of Exeter for his B.A. in History and his teacher training. He emigrated to Canada in 1963 and has lived here since then. Teaching initially in Kelowna, B.C., then becoming Vice-Principal and later Principal in Ashcroft led him into an M.Ed. at UBC (1968) and a Ph.D from the University of Chicago (1975). He worked for three years in research organizations in Edmonton and Regina before his appointment to the Faculty of Education at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, B.C. He spent 24 years at SFU as a professor and academic administrator until his appointment as Dean of Education at Brock University in 1998. At SFU he developed a particular interest in the intersection of law and educational policy and enrolled in an LLM program at UBC, completing his thesis during his term as Dean. He held the position of Acting Academic Vice-President at Brock for 18 months during a change in the senior administration and followed that by serving as the Director of the Tecumseh Centre for Aboriginal Research and Education until he retired in 2011.

He is the proud father of four adult children—Naomi, Sean, Rachel and Kirsten—each of whom is married with two children of their own and employed in a variety of professional occupations.

Finding an Unknown Cousin

Invocation & Toast to the Queen: Doreen Peever

Speaker Introduction: Doreen Peever Our much appreciated and frequent Torch speaker, John Mayer, was born in Budapest, Hungary in 1935. He married Elizabeth in 1960 and together they had four children. He taught Philosophy at Brock University for 23 years, and was a long-standing Unitarian lay chaplain. The depth of Doreen's introduction was only exceeded by the excel-

lence of John's talk. Few can match John's ability to deliver such a well constructed and coherent talk without notes and under the allotted time frame.

Joys of Collecting by Dr. John Mayer John began his talk by suggesting collectors of anything neither useful nor necessary are either greedy or have a character disorder and then proceeded to show the opposite. From his personal collection of Roman coins, John took us on a fascinating historical tour featuring the notorious family scandal of 326 AD. In one version, Fausta (Constantine's second wife) accused Crispus (Constantine's son by his first wife) of Crispus killed in a fit of rage and Fausta suffocated in her bath. And yet all three of Constantine's sons by Fausta became Roman emperors (Constantine II, Constantius II & Constans). It's a family saga well preserved by the coins John had on display, and Torch talk on Oct 20. Once again, Reed Taylor has members could freely touch a part of Roman history as scandalous as it was.

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This was Anne's third time to hear one of John's "always interesting" presentations. She agreed, collecting has nothing to do with "greed," but rather with "passion."
