Speaker: Dan Madar

I was born in Spokane, Washington and grew up in San Francisco. My BA is in International Relations from San Francisco State University - the first institution to found a separate department of IR. My MA and PhD are from the University of Toronto. I taught International Relations at Brock University for 41 years, retiring in 2012. I have written three books, and the most recent one, **Big Steel**, is on the world steel industry. In addition to IR I taught West European Politics, the international economy and co-taught the MA program's core seminar on great works in politics. My retirement status is professor emeritus.

Topic: Will We Miss the Cold War?

The collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991 ended the Cold War. For 45 years that conflict had organized the world into opposing blocs, secured by massive and carefully balanced deployments of armed force. Huge nuclear arsenals made both sides careful to avoid any clashes that might escalate, making the system frightening but stable.

Since then Russia and China have become revisionist powers. Both seek to enlarge their spheres of dominance, and both show themselves ready to use military force. Russia has already done so by annexing Crimea and backing an insurgency in eastern Ukraine. European states along Russia's periphery fear that they will be next. China claims the

South China Sea as sovereign territory and is converting islands and atolls into de-facto possessions. China insists that its neighbours defer to its economic and military power. Countries in both regions depend on collective defence - NATO for Europe and bilateral alliances and security agreements for Asia. Key to both is the orientation of the United States.

The dynamic is psychological as well as material.
